Operation Report Card

No, this is not a back to school promotion, but an announcement of a new program developed by the Carlsbad Police Department. It is a new vehicle security awareness and crime prevention program called, "Operation Report Card."

Throughout Carlsbad parks, recreation areas, and parking lots, unattended vehicles are being broken into at increased rates. The police department is enhancing enforcement and implementing this program to reduce the opportunity for crime. The best way to stop these thefts is to remove all property form unattended vehicles and by doing so community members will be removing the "opportunity" for crime.

Police will be placing yellow notices on cars that will let the driver know the security status of the vehicle. The notices will also give other prevention tips. The goal of the program is to create a Police-Community collaboration that ultimately reduces the occurrence of vehicle crime. According to Chief Gary Morrison, "Effective policing takes teamwork and together we can reduce crime and ensure a safe and secure summer for everyone."

Tips from the Program Coordinator, Adam Young:

* When possible, park where you can see you see it.

* Remove ALL property from unattended vehicles. If you can't take it with you, leave it at home.

* Always lock your vehicle and take the keys.

* Don't leave a hidden key on or in your vehicle.

* At home, park your vehicle in the garage, and remove all personal property and lock it.

* If you cannot park in a locked garage, park as close to your house as possible and lock your vehicle.

* Be the eyes and ears of your area by calling the Police Department for suspicious activity or to report a crime
